Dear Dr. Rigoberto Cuellar,

We, 95 civil society organisations from 31 countries, are writing in relation to the CDM Project 3197: 'Aguan biogas recovery from Palm Oil Mill Effluent (POME) ponds and biogas utilisation - Exportadora del Atlántico, Aguan/Honduras' which was approved by SERNA With the reference SSERNA-164-2008 on November 13 2008.

Minister, the undersigned organisations wish to express their deepest concerns regarding CDM Project 3197 situated in the Bajo Aguan Valley. According to information provided by the courts and district attorneys of Tocoa and Trujillo, the Special Attorney for Human Rights, public statements of other state departments, journalists and media in addition to national and international civil society and human rights organizations¹ it appears that violence against peasant communities and grave human rights violations continue to occur with absolute impunity in the Bajo Aguan region.

On 5 November 2011, the Interamerican Comission on Human Rights (IACHR) expressed its deepest concerns on the case Bajo Aguan in its final report of the 143rd regular session: "The IACHR is particularly concerned about the situation in the Bajo Aguán region of Honduras, where 42 individuals affiliated with campesino organizations, as well as a journalist and his spouse, reportedly were killed between September 2009 and October 2011, in the context of an Agrarian conflict. In a hearing on this situation, the Commission received information regarding the criminalization of the campesino struggle and the militarization of the area, which has reportedly placed the peasant farmers and human rights defenders in the Bajo Aguán in a state of high risk."²

According to public information available at national and international level, the owner of the project 3197 plays a key role in the Agrarian conflict in the Bajo Aguan. Furthermore, the security guards employed by the project owner have been denounced by local, national and international organisations as main agents of the violence undertaken against the farming

communities, as well as direct perpetrators of the assassination of five farmers on November 15th 2010 (El Tumbador case).

We are dismayed by the fact that, according to information provided by the authorities so far, no progress has been made in the investigation of these crimes which increases the risk that these acts of violence will remain unpunished. This is alarming when considering the seriousness of the situation and the potential economic consequences for Honduras and its international reputation.

The signatories urge the SERNA to re-examine in detail whether the project 3197 complies with all criteria set out for granting an approval letter by you. Following this review process we demand timely disclosure of the results including the criteria itself. We furthermore urge you to ensure that the Hondurian authorities fulfil their duty to investigate and punish with expedience, all crimes and human rights violations committed in Bajo Aguán, and pursue penal action against both the material and intellectual authors of these acts.

We trust that you will take this matter seriously,
